

Konstantinos Moustakas was born in Athens in 1968. He graduated from the 2<sup>nd</sup> High-school of Athens in 1986. He received his first degree in History from the University of Ioannina (1990), and continued his graduate studies at the University of Birmingham (UK), at the Centre for Byzantine, Ottoman and Modern Greek Studies, receiving an MPhil (1993) and PhD (2001) in Byzantine and Ottoman studies, supervised by Prof. A.A.M. Bryer and Dr. Rhoads Murphey. His doctoral dissertation's topic is *The Transition from Late Byzantine to Early Ottoman Southeastern Macedonia (14<sup>th</sup>-15<sup>th</sup> Centuries)*. Later he graduated in Political Science by the Department of Political Science and Public Policy of the University of Athens. He fulfilled his military obligation in the years 1997 and 1998. He worked at the 2<sup>nd</sup> Ephorate of Byzantine Antiquities (1999) and the Foundation of Hellenic World as a research cadre (2000-2002). Upon he received his PhD, he teaches Byzantine history at the University of Crete, Dept. of History and Archaeology, as a lecturer on temporary appointment (2002-2005), a lecturer (2005-2010) and assistant professor (2010-present). Since 2006, he also works at the Hellenic Open University as associate teaching staff. Between 2004 and 2011 he was an associate research fellow of the Institute of Mediterranean Studies (FORTH). His research interests revolve around the comparative study of Byzantine and Ottoman institutions and social realities; the social, economic and demographic history of late Byzantium, the early Ottoman Empire and the medieval Balkans; aspects of the transition between the Late Byzantine and Early Ottoman historical realities; byzantine views of the Ottoman ascent; late Byzantine and Post-byzantine historiography; as well as on medieval Balkan history. He is author of the book *Ιστορία των μεσαιωνικών Βαλκανίων, 7<sup>ος</sup> - 11<sup>ος</sup> αι.*, Athens: Hellenic Association of Academic Libraries, 2015, and of about 25 articles in scientific journals and volumes; he has a more or less similar number of communications in scientific conferences. He is married with two children.
