Sector of Ancient and Medieval History

Ancient History (AIS)

AIS 607	Katerina Panagopoulou	The Hellenistic East: the Seleucid kingdom (Lecture course)	5 ECTS
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Course summary

The Seleucid kingdom succeeded the Achaemenid (Persian) Empire in Asia Minor and the East after Alexander's death. Administrators of Makedonian origin faced the challenge of establishing an effective, functional and long-lasting administrative machine upon the structures laid under Persian rule. The Seleucid paradigm highlights the process in which two cultures, Hellenic and Persian-Achaemenid, were combined in Hellenistic kingdoms. Questions will be raised, such as: what was the attitude of the new hegemons *vis-à-vis* existing institutions in the conquered regions? In what ways did they attempt to establish and maintain power? Did local populations react violently against them or did they accept them as pursuers of the old *régime*? Which features emerged from the combination between the Achaemenid and the Greek culture? What sprang from the merging between Greek and Eastern religious beliefs? How did the Seleucids treat their counterparts in other Hellenistic Kingdoms? And, ultimately, why and in what ways did Rome penetrate into the world of the former Persian Empire? How did it manage to appropriate the later Seleukids and, ultimately, to dominate Asia?

AIS 501	Kostas Vlassopoulos	Athenian democracy (Lecture course)	5 ECTS
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Course summary

The object of this module is the political system of ancient Athens. We shall examine Athenian democracy as a complex amalgam of political institutions, practices and ideologies; we shall also focus on the extent to which it was a coherent system, as well as the important contradictions that it contained. Equally important will be the exploration of the relationship between the Athenian political system and its contemporary social, economic and cultural framework. Finally, we shall examine in detail the role of the non-elite citizens in the historical development of Athenian democracy.

Medieval History – Western Europe (IMCH)

IMCH 229	Michael Naidos	Christian and secular society in medieval Europe (Lecture course)	5 ECTS
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Course summary

The course will concentrate on the interaction between the Church and religion on the one hand and secular society on the other hand during the Middle Ages (5th - 15th centuries). Particular reference will be made to the role of Christianity and the Church in the formation of institutions, attitudes and perceptions in medieval society, but also to the institution of kingship during the Middle Ages in the West. The aim of the course is the understanding of the factors that shaped medieval European civilization in the context of examining the interaction between the Church and the "State" during the Middle Ages.

IMCH 335	Michael Naidos	Social unrest and reversal in the central and late Middle Ages (Seminar)	10 ECTS
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Course summary

The course will focus mainly on the impact of economic and demographic fluctuations on the social structures, values and attitudes of Medieval Europe between the middle of the 10th and the 15th century. Six thematic modules will be covered, through which the topics of the written papers that the students must deliver at the end of the semester will be chosen. Particular emphasis will be made on the 14th century demographic and economic crisis, on the revolts (rural, urban) of the late Middle Ages, and their impact on the political, social and economic structures of Medieval Europe, but also on the formation of ideologies, attitudes and perceptions in Medieval society.

Modern and Contemporary History (INCH)

INCH 210	Efi Avdela	Gender history, 19 th -20 th c. (Lecture course)	5 ECTS
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Course summary

Focusing on western societies since the French Revolution, the course examines changes over time in the relations between men and women and in the meanings of gender difference, and their social and political consequences. Drawing from the extensive research on European and Greek gender history, the course will refer to themes such as work, family, citizenship but also nationalism, colonialism and social contention.

INCH 179	Socrates Petmezas	The birth of the Modern World, 1767-1945: A global history (Lecture course)	5 ECTS
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Course summary

This course will examine the formation of the Contemporary world from the industrial revolution and the colonial expansion of the European great Powers to the South and Eastern Asia until the Second World War as a global process which rapidly and intensively integrated the World economy and engaged all the societal systems and state entities of the globe.

INCH 325	Socrates Petmezas	Social and political history of the Balkans (1830-1940) (Seminar)	10 ECTS
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Course summary

The course will focus on selected issues related to the diplomatic, political and social history of Balkan States (Ottoman provinces included) and societies from the end of the Greek and Serbian Wars of independence to the Second World War. Students will be asked to use bibliography in languages other than Greek.

Modern and Contemporary History (INCH)

TOY 247	Antonis Anastopoulos	Mustafa Kemal Atatürk (Lecture course)	5 ECTS
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Course summary

The course aims at discussing the life of Mustafa Kemal Atatürk (1881-1938), officer of the Ottoman army, then leader of the Turkish War of Independence and, finally, founder and first President of the Republic of Turkey. During classes we will raise the issue of the relationship between the person and the military and political leader Atatürk and we will cover both aspects of his private life and his public activity and image. In order to explain especially Atatürk's policies, but also aspects of his personality, we will seek to integrate them into the wider Turkish and international context of his time.

Week 2: Birth and childhood – the Ottoman Empire in the second half of the nineteenth century.

Week 3: Military education and career.

Week 4: The Young Turk Revolution and triumvirate, 1908-1914.

Week 5: World War I, 1914-1918.

Week 6: Foreign occupation and the Turkish War of Independence, 1918-1922.

Week 7: The end of the Ottoman Empire and the establishment of the Republic of Turkey, 1922-1924.

Week 8: Establishment of personal authority and reforms, 1925-1929.

Week 9: The 1930s.

Week 10: Discussion of the personality, policies and ideology of Kemal Atatürk.

Week 11: Film screening and discussion.

Week 12: Atatürk's legacy.

Week 13: Atatürk in the 21st century– revision – general discussion.

Sector of Archaeology and History of Art

Prehistoric Archaeology (PAR)

PAR 201	Nena Galanidou	Public Archaeology (Lecture course)	5 ECTS
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Course summary

This course will familiarize students with Public Archaeology as an agent of scientific research in the public sphere. The original mission of Public Archaeology was to communicate the finds and theories of archaeology to the wider public. Its research goal has now expanded to explore all aspects of the relationship and interaction between Archaeology and modern society. Topics such as ancient heritage and sustainable growth, the importance of monuments, the architectural, archaeological and museological perspectives of public space will constitute the core of this course. In addition, we will examine the social impact and reception of archaeological research and finds, as well as the contribution and the role of citizens and non-governmental organizations in the protection and the promotion of cultural heritage. Finally, initiatives for the communication of formal archaeology with the wider public in Greece and Europe are going to be evaluated in terms of their impact on archaeological science and on linking the present with the past.

Classical Archaeology (KAR)

KAR 354	Pavlina Karanastasi	Personifications and allegories in ancient Greek art (Seminar)	10 ECTS
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Course summary

The purpose of the seminar is to examine and analyze basic personalized concepts as presented in ancient greek and roman literary and epigraphic sources and in iconography. Among these are Dike, Eunomia, Peitho, Eros, Hypnos, Thanatos, Himeros, Pothos, Themis and others. They are distinguished mainly in those that have a wider political significance and concern communities such as the Polis and its institutions (for example Demos, Democracy, etc.) and those related to private life through the depiction of specific mythological scenes and the "world" of women.

KAR 133	Dimitris Bosnakis	Archaic Sculpture: Form – Function and Sources (Lecture course)	5 ECTS
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Course summary

The aim of this lecture is to present the development of the plastic art (free-standing, reliefs and architectural sculpture) of the archaic period (7th-6th century BC) focusing mainly on the form (material, technical, morphological - stylistic features, iconographic types), the function (use and purpose), the emotions and the ideas of the early society. The study of the works based also on literary testimonia.

KAR 133	Nicholas Stampolidis	From ancient Eleutherna. Issues and approaches from an emerging ancient city (Seminar)	10 ECTS
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Course summary

The seminar includes issues and topics for the initiation of a systematic excavation, legal and intellectual issues, the emergence of an archaeological site and scientific issues, such as conservation, photographing, documenting and publishing findings. The example of ancient Eleutherna is compared with other analogues inside and outside Crete.

History of Western Art (ITD)

ITD 152	Titina Kornezou	Dutch painting in the seventeenth century (Lecture course)	5 ECTS
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Course summary

The purpose of the course is to survey the development of seventeenth century Dutch painting. Focusing on specific paintings by the most significant painters of this period, it will examine the rise and diffusion of diverse themes such as landscape painting, portrait, genre painting, still-life painting, in the historical and cultural context of seventeenth century Dutch Republic.

ITD 367	Titina Kornezou	Theory and historiography of the Baroque (Seminar)	10 ECTS
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Course summary

This seminar focusses on the diverse meanings of the term “baroque” as they were defined and used in the art historiography since the 19th c.. Through the study of this particular topic, the seminar aims to familiarize the students with issues of art historiography, periodization and methodologies in art history.

ITD 231	Evgenios D. Matthiopoulos	From Munich to Paris: The History of Greek Art, from the Late 19th Century until the Greco-Turkish War (1918-1922) (Lecture course)	5 ECTS
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Course summary

The goal of the course-work is to discuss the aesthetic hegemony gained by the artists trained at the Munich Academy of Arts from the 1860s until the Greco-Turkish War (1918-1922), as well as to highlight the gradual introduction and assimilation in

Greece of the modernist ideas and art movements originating from Paris, Munich and Vienna, such as Realism, Symbolism, Impressionism and Post-impressionism.

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Course summary

The Seminar's goal is to introduce to the students the main aspects of methodology, terminology and periodology pertaining to the historiography of Neo-Hellenic Art. Concurrently, there will be an attempt to interpret significant events and trends during the course of the general socio-political developments of the period. In particular, the lectures shall focus on the historical studies by Stelios Lidakis, Hrisanthos Hristou, Tonis Spiteris, Miltiadis Papanicolaou, Marina Lampraki-Plaka, Antonis Kotidis etc.

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
